SPOTLIGHT: Scholar-in-Residence Seminar

QUESTION: What happens when an equal cohort of Israel's top Arab and Jewish teenaged classical musicians come together for two four-day immersion experiences?

ANSWER: Magical performances, onstage and offstage.

This year forty students, instructors and lecturers participated in our Scholar-in-Residence program. Together, they built a shared ensemble fostered by genuine relationship-building and a sense of belonging in the greater Israeli and global cultural community.

ONSTAGE

Top professionals of the Israeli and Berlin Philharmonic Orchestras ran intensive sectional rehearsals of two works by Ludwig van Beethoven and one by Edvard Grieg, which culminated in a public concert.

Our young people became exceptionally skilled at listening to each other,



looking at each other and building their unified sound.

OFFSTAGE

Leading intellectuals led discussions that encouraged our young people to explore how a particular piece of music speaks to them as performers, and how it relates to them as maturing adolescents in a diverse and conflicted society.

During the first residency in Nazareth in April, Arab youth hosted Jewish youth on a city tour, with a stop at the best sweet shop (of course!). In October, they all bunked together at Kibbutz Keshet Eilon, creating an open and inviting environment for our young people to have genuine interactions and conversations.

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LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends,

The activity of making music as an ensemble carries people beyond politics, beyond boundaries.

It brings musicians, instructors and audience members together in ways that make it possible to see 'the other' and build new relationships.

As we write this letter to you, the U.S. Presidential election has just upended predictability. As the chasm of divide appears to grow larger, we must seek new tools and approaches for moving forward together.

At Polyphony, our young people have been breaking down the barriers of the Arab and Jewish communities in Israel since 2011. It is this long term, day-in and day-out work of creating new kinds of conversations that is building a new social fabric from the ground up. One graduate recently summed it up like this: "Polyphony brought the Arab community into my life."

Indeed, our parents share that without Polyphony they would have never developed friendships with families of a different religion. Young Arab musicians speak to the experience of being equal while performing alongside their Jewish peers. Jewish teens lead their peers away from hatred and distrust. School children go out of their comfort zones together to learn to appreciate classical music.

In creating joint music opportunities for over 10,000 young people a year, Polyphony's holistic multi-tiered programming has become a vehicle for social transformation. Ours is a place where people can express hope by showing and sharing the power of music to build a new kind of community.

We thank you for everything you have given to invest in the lives of our young people and our innovative model for change. These times demand innovation and Polyphony is proud to be leading the way in helping people see new possibilities for themselves, their communities and for Israel.


